GOV. BLAGOJEVICH ANNOUNCES \$563,000 TO FOUR HIGH-TECH, CHICAGO AREA COMPANIES TO HELP SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW HOMELAND SECURITY PRODUCTS

Innovative Product Grants Will Help Create 65 New Jobs in the Western Suburbs

CHICAGO - Gov. Rod R. Blagojevich today announced \$563,000 in Opportunity Returns funding to four high-technology, suburban-based companies to increase commercialization efforts and enhance homeland security applications, helping to create 65 new jobs over the next two years and retain 45 other jobs. This funding is provided in large part through the Innovative Product Grant (IPG) Program administered by Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity's (DCEO) Homeland Security Market Development (HSMD) bureau. IPG is the nation's first state-funded grant program focused on developing products to meet homeland security needs. DCEO Director Jack Lavin made the announcement along with company representatives at the Northern Illinois University-Naperville campus.

"The key to advancing Illinois in the global economy is to encourage innovation through investment and supporting the development of new and existing technologies that will create a safer, cleaner, healthier and more efficient world. The investments in these four exemplary companies demonstrate our continued commitment to help Illinois businesses meet the ongoing challenges in the homeland security industry and create high-paying, high-tech jobs," Gov. Blagojevich said.

The following companies are receiving grants:

Current Technologies Corporation (CTC), an IP-service provider based in Naperville, will use this \$100,000 IPG grant to further develop its wireless surveillance system, which combines outdoor wireless transmission with networked video surveillance, for the homeland security market. The system has been successfully piloted in Bellwood in which 22 cameras installed in high crime areas with feeds connecting them to the Bellwood Police Department contributed to a 15 percent crime reduction. CTC is working with several other municipalities as well. The grant will help the company create 12 new jobs over the next two years and retain 16 jobs. Lemko Corporation, a cellular communications provider based in Schaumburg, will use this \$150,000 IPG grant to fully commercialize its Distributed Mobile Architecture system for cellular networks. Lemko provides the world's only cellular voice and broadband flat-mesh network for homeland security, first responders, and continuity of operations for business and government. Lemko's On Demand Cellular (ODC) solution, which switches and routes voice and data at the network's edge, has performed a series of trials with customers in Asia, Latin America and the US Army. Sunrock Ceramics Company, LLC is an advanced ceramics producer based in Broadview. The company will use this \$75,000 IPG award to enhance its applications in servicing the

aerospace/defense, electronics/semi-conductor, laser, medical imaging and electrical distribution industries. The company will also receive an additional \$87,750 in tax credits and training grants, as part of a \$1 million investment to increase its production capabilities. End-use products that would utilize Sunrock's ceramic components include night vision goggles, body armor, high-powered laser tubes, radar systems, diesel pollution filters and solid-oxide fuel cells. The state assistance will help the company create at least 10 new jobs over the next two years. Univa Corporation, a software and services company based in Lisle, will use this \$150,000 IPG award to accelerate the development of enhancements to the open source Globus software that enable IT infrastructure for secure, large-scale, distributed data management in global enterprises. This technology is based on the grid computing work done at Argonne National Laboratory. The grant will help the company create 12 new jobs over the next two years and retain 29 additional jobs. IPG funds are intended to help create jobs and increase economic activity in Illinois, while strengthening the state's competitive position as a leader in science and technology innovation.

"In just a short period of time, Gov. Blagojevich's IPG Program has already made an immediate and lasting contribution to the homeland security industry by providing almost \$3 million in working capital to businesses to accelerate the commercialization of new and innovative homeland security products and services. These four companies are excellent examples to support the need to develop more effective products and advance technologies that contribute to improving our national security and creating more good jobs," DCEO Director Jack Lavin said.
